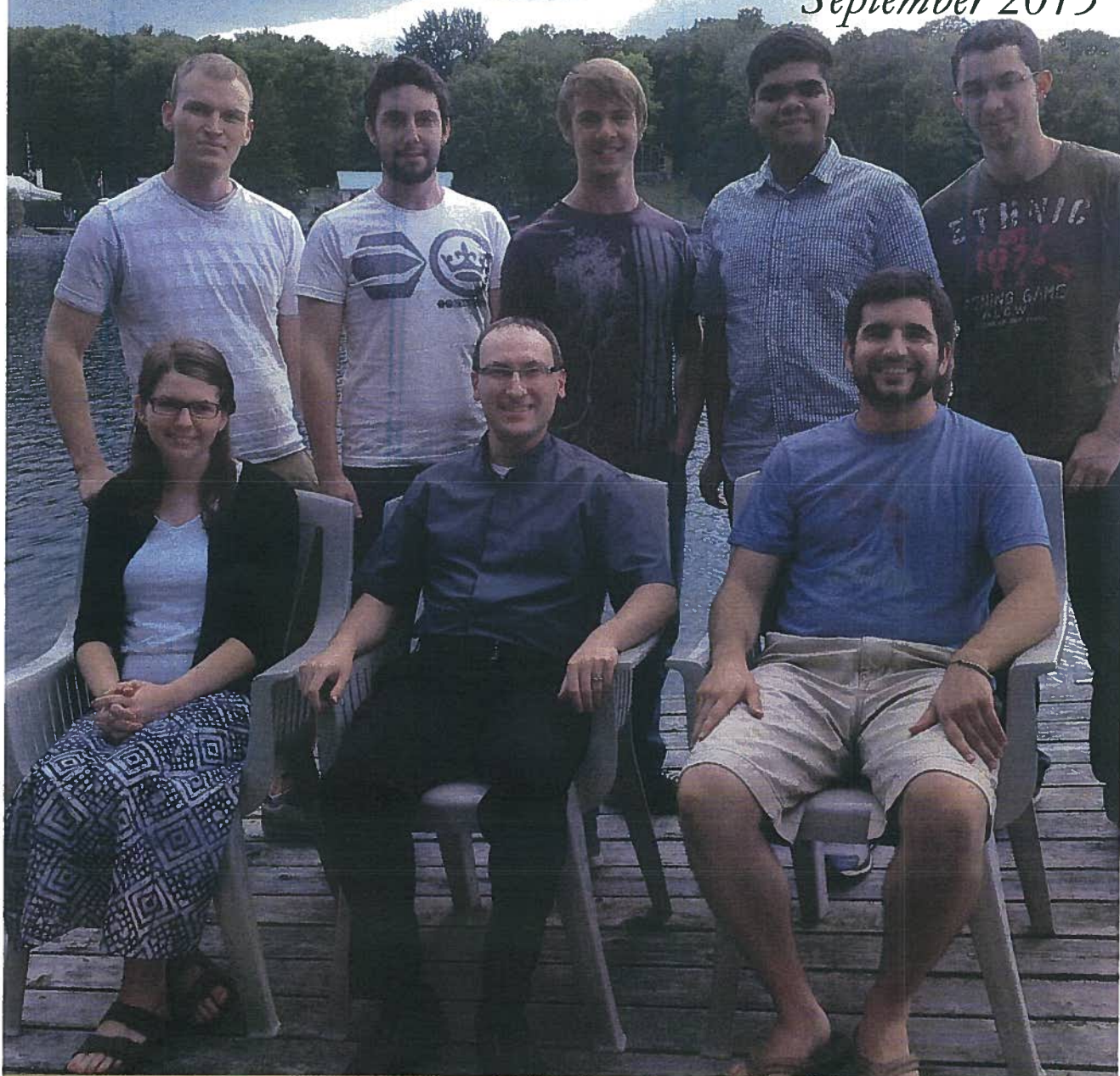

NEWMAN! With these words I would like to greet all new students and faculty who are choosing the Newman Centre as their Catholic home on campus. I would also like to welcome back all returning students, faculty and Newmanites who were away for the summer. I hope that you all had a restful summer and are excited to be back to Newman!

Over the Labour Day weekend I had the privilege of getting to know better our new team of Student Campus Ministers at their orientation retreat at Parry Sound. In the few days they have been together, this fine group of undergrad and grad students have already manifested a great desire to grow in holiness and to work in unison to serve and to share the Good News. In order to assist Erin with her indispensable work and expand our campus ministry to unexplored territory, a decision was made to hire Sonal Castelino on a part-time basis to study the needs of grad students and faculty and to coordinate the RCIA and Confirmation programs in our parish. Naturally, I cannot capture everything that is going on at Newman in just one page. So please take the time to read this bulletin, discover what's coming up, and participate!

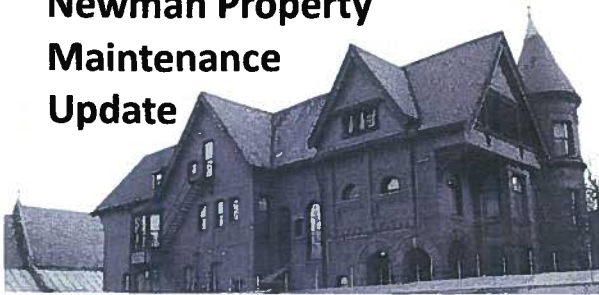

Newman Property Maintenance Update



We are all blessed by the beautiful architecture of Newman Centre's house and St. Thomas Aquinas Church. With the provision of being able to conduct our ministry in these historic buildings, we also have the challenge of responding to the inevitable maintenance concerns associated with ageing structures. While we have a modest regular maintenance budget for both the house and church, there have been a number of unplanned repairs this year to date.

Beginning with the church, during the winter months we had to urgently replace a failed ventor motor and thermostat for one furnace to continue to deliver heat, at a cost of \$840.

We also discovered that a number of downspout drains around the church were clogged. We were able to have most of them cleared in July, with the installation of new cleanouts to provide access for future maintenance. Instead of excavating two of the drains we were not able to flush out (thus saving over \$4,000), we are now re-diverting some eavestroughs and rainwater leaders to prevent water seeping into the church basement. We also had to replace two downspouts on the east side of the

church. The total cost of this work is approximately \$4,100.

A bigger concern is the state of the church's roof. Last year, there were 3 occasions where we had to replace some copper panels near where the copper meets the slate due to water penetration. We've also had to replace approximately 80 slates that were cracked and broken. These and related repairs had costs us nearly \$8,000. In monitoring the roof this year, we are discovering a few more areas where water is dripping in under the aged copper roof. We are now at the point where we need to investigate investing in a new roof, or at least replacing the west metal portion. Please look for updates in the coming months about the results of our findings, and how you can help.

Finally, the house has many more repairs to consider, but the most pressing has been replacing the heating system's boiler valves and pipes manifold in the basement. As a major safety concern, all 31 valves and the main pipes and branches from the boiler had to be replaced this summer. We are thankful to the Archdiocese of Toronto who covered the cost of the repairs - nearly \$21,000. In addition to this work, we've had to respond to a few leaks coming from the house roof, which cost close to \$1,000 to repair.

Sunday Underground Parking

The Newman Centre has arrangements for Sunday Mass parking with University of Toronto Parking Services and pays a discounted rate of \$3.00 per vehicle on behalf of parishioners who park in the underground Rotman garage, located at 107 St. George St.

The pay-on-foot ticket system began last November, but as a refresher for those who haven't parked there in a while, or for those who are new to parking underground, please note the following parking procedures:

- 1) Take the ticket obtained upon entry to the garage and bring it to Mass.
- 2) At the end of Mass, show your ticket to a hospitality minister at the back of the Chapel. They will give out a 2nd "chaser" ticket, to be used in conjunction with the original ticket.
- 3) When exiting the garage in your vehicle, insert both tickets in the card reader to open the gate.

More detailed information on this process is posted at the back of the chapel and at the reception desk in the house.

Please Note: If you park in the underground on Sunday and if you are able to contribute \$3.00 each Sunday to offset our costs, it would be greatly appreciated. Please also be aware that street parking along Hoskin Ave. and on St. George Street is FREE on Sundays until 1 p.m.

here at the university. This year I'll be blogging for the Newman Centre website, where you can stay tuned to hear more from me.

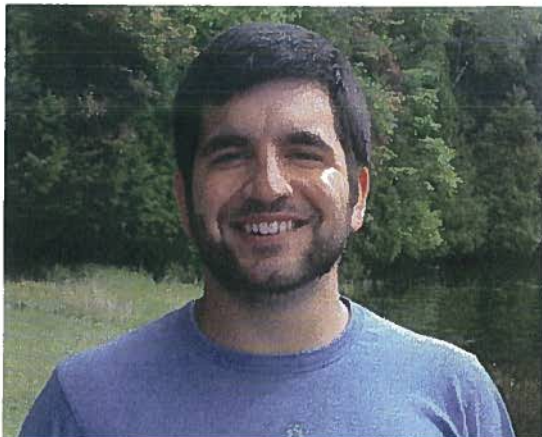
Ministers Profiles

This is my first time in North America, and I am glad to see so many people expressing their faith in Christ in this part of the continent. I hope I can help you with my prayers and my time while I am living in this community.

I am **Karol Czuba** and I am a first-year PhD student in Political Science. My academic interests centre on the question of power in agropastoralist and pastoralist societies in East Africa and the Horn.

I am intrigued by the ways in which those who possess authority seek to exercise their power to control others and establish legitimacy for their authority, and the ways in which those perceived as powerless react to such actions. These interests are strongly influenced by my faith and by the interplay between authority and powerlessness in Christ's emptying and relinquishment of His earthly life in preparation for His ultimate victory.

I became a Catholic as a graduate student at Oxford and, inspired by His and His many followers' examples—subsequently worked with vulnerable populations in South Sudan and Uganda. Lumen Fidei: The Light of Faith

Excerpt from *Lumen fidei* (The light of faith) - the first Encyclical signed by Pope Francis - on the relationship between truth, love and faith:

"Only to the extent that love is grounded in truth can it endure over time, can it transcend the passing moment and be sufficiently solid to sustain a shared journey. If love is not tied to truth, it falls prey to fickle emotions and cannot stand the test of time. True love, on the other hand, unifies all the elements of our person and becomes a new light pointing the way to a great and fulfilled life. Without truth, love is incapable of establishing a firm bond; it cannot liberate our isolated ego or redeem it from the fleeting moment in order to create life and bear fruit." (27)

Feast of St. Michael - Sunday, September 29

On August 20, 2013 Cardinal Collins published the following message:

"The Catholic Church in Toronto has been under the patronage of St. Michael the Archangel from the very beginnings of the Archdiocese. For over 150 years, St. Michael has protected the Catholic faithful who have come here from so many different lands and cultures. As a way of recognizing our great patron and to strengthen the unity among all the faithful, I would like the Feast of St. Michael to be celebrated in the parishes and communities of our archdiocese every year with special solemnity.

This year, the feast day - September 29th - falls on a Sunday, which would otherwise be celebrated as the 26th Sunday of Ordinary Time. However, for pastoral reasons I am declaring that this year, on September 29th the Feast of St. Michael is to be celebrated throughout the Archdiocese of Toronto. [...] As part of the Year of Faith, I had issued a Decree granting certain Plenary Indulgences. One of those was for those who, "on the feast day of St. Michael participate in Holy Mass or in the Liturgy of the Hours adding the Profession of Faith in any legitimate form at any church."

The Catholicism series viewings this summer at Newman were very insightful and an enjoyable experience. There were two parts to the experience—the DVD viewings and the discussion held thereafter.

DVD Viewings The videos themselves shed a lot of new light on the deepest of truths.

For example, in one of the episodes, Fr. Barron talks about the three wise men coming to see Jesus. They came to visit him in Bethlehem, but on the way back they took a different route to avoid King Herod who was trying to kill the newborn king that they had just encountered. The key notion here is that anyone who comes to Jesus does not return the same way.

In other cases Fr. Barron takes familiar quotes that are often misunderstood and explains them. For example: "If any one *strikes* you on the *right* cheek, turn the other also" (Mt 5:38-42). When people hear this quote, they commonly think that if someone punches them in the face, they should not protect their face but passively 'just stand there' and take the beating. This is not the case. There are two words of interest here, "Strike" and "Right". Why are they of interest? In Hebrew there are different words for "strike." In this context it means 'to slap' with the backhand. In order to slap someone on the *right* cheek, one would need to use the backhand of the *left* hand. The *left* hand is considered to be the 'un-clean' hand. If you slap someone with the back of your left hand, you insult them very deeply. Here it is not meant as a physical punch, but an insult to one's honour. In addition, most people think that giving the other cheek would mean to be a passive person who is willing to take insults without doing anything about it. But this is not what Jesus had in mind. He asked his disciples to do something about it by giving the other cheek. Instead of bursting into anger, one should show the other person that the insults that are thrown at you do not bother you. For example Jesus was crucified on a cross, which was designed to be a great insult. But now the cross has become the main Catholic symbol of the faith. In this way Jesus showed the other cheek and turned an insult against itself.

Discussions after Viewings The DVD viewings in themselves were great. Yet the discussions thereafter added a lot more value to the viewings as they solidified one's understanding by hearing various perspectives. In sharing ideas, one would see how other people would react to them. To explain what is meant here, take for instance IDEO's design team. IDEO is a company that has been designing products for 30 years, including the first Apple mouse (see Yvonne Rogers et al., *Interaction Design: Beyond Human-Computer Interaction*, 3rd ed., ch.1.3.3). Their teams often consist of 10-20 members who come from completely different backgrounds. One might be an engineer concerned about implementation, another might be a lawyer concerned about legal matters, yet another might be an architect who is concerned about usability. Each member of the design team will see the same object in a different way. They may see some aspects of the object on their own, but they only see the '*whole*' object when they discuss it in a group.

In much the same way when viewing the DVDs alone, one might only see their own perspective. But viewing them together gives a deeper understanding of the whole. Also, it's a lot of fun and a good place to meet new people! I attended all 10 sessions this summer and would highly recommend the Catholicism series to anyone!
